





- SWAG for your future students to wear and door prizes



HOPE Program SUMMARY

- Students must graduate from high school with a 3.0 GPA as saleulated by the Georgia Student Finance Commission for a college prep digitoria or a 3.2 for a career tech diploma. Students graduating under the single diploma type must have a 3.0 GPA so saleulated by GSPC.
- Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA in college
- If a student falls below a 3.0 GPA in college, they may only regain the HOPE Scholarship one time.
- The HCPE Scholarship will not pay for remedial or developmental courses. - A student may receive the HOPE Scholarship until the first of those events

 - The student has carried a bacculaureate or first professional degree;
 - The student has attempted at any postsecondary institution a total of 190 quarter hours or 127 semester
 - The student has received a total information of payment of 127 senseter bours or 193 quarter bours from the HCPE Substanding, HCPE Grain, and Assel program (Asset payments made beginning with
 - Pall 2011 term are excluded from the 127 hour cap), or Regioning with those students receiving MOPE for the first time on or after high 1, 2011, seven years from a student graduation from high school or the equivalent, provided, however, that for a student that arrees on active duty in the military during such arren-year period such active duty service time will be are dised back to the arren years.

The HOPE Scholarship will pays

- At an eligible public promocordary institution, for FY2012, a percentage amount of the standard tuition charges from the previous year. In subsequent years, the award amount will be a percentage of the immediately preceding year's HOPE Award Amount (view the chart on GAcollege 11) to find
- At an slightle private post-countary institution, a persontage amount of the HOPE award amount for
 private colleges.

For students graduating on or after May 1, 2015, they must pass 2 courses from the following types of courses

- Advanced Math
- Advanced Placement (AP) in core subjects
- International Baccalauresta (IB) in core subjects. Core subjects tehan at a University System of Georgia
- (USG) Institution or
- Advanced Foreign Language For students graduating on or after May 1, 2016. they must pass 3 courses. For students aradiasting on or after May 1, 2017.

SUMMER MELT FOR UNDERSERVED STUDENTS

- Not the Financial Aid Term
- "College Intending" students who've been accepted but fail to attend college in the fall
- Melt Rate: 10-40% of students each year
- Mostly low and moderate-income students or lower academic achievement
- Low income students have much higher "melt" rates

SUMMER MELT FOR UNDERSERVED STUDENTS

- Signing on to the College Portal
- Tuition Bill
- Health Insurance

Use School Partnerships

- Provide aggregate reports on the total number of students from that district or school who paid a deposit vs. the total number that enroll so they will know the percent "melting."
- Call, text or meet with "college-intending" students over the summer to avoid missing key summer benchmarks
- Near-Peer Mentor Intervention: Utilize currently enrolled students/mentors for outreach over summer.
- Utilize Social Media and You tube videos encouraging students to complete key tasks over the summer
- Conduct Engaging Summer Bridge Programs

- Free Housing and Meal Plan

Uwise Summer Bridge Program Evaluation



- Out-performed non-Bridge students in MATH 1634, CHEM 1212, BIOL 1107, BIOL 1108, and BIOL 2107
- Statistically Significant increase in mean pretest and post-test scores
- 34% of students have increased interest in STEM major

Program Summary

The College Access Challenge Grant program seeks to increase postsecondary degree attainment of prekindergarten to grade 12 students traditionally underrepresented in higher education. These students include first-time freshmen, transfer students, adults returning to college, and the military. It also works to increase degree attainment of Georgia's low income adults with some college credit but no degree.

The Cotlege Access Challenge Grant program emphasizes performance, partnerships, and the overall value to higher education as part of its metrics for success.
